The teenage years are crucial years that prepare a boy or girl for life. Decisions made while we are young can have lifelong implications. The intent of this article is to provide a little guidance and suggestions on how to manage the teenage years.

The teenage years are a time of rapid challenging and uncomfortable change. A young man or woman makes a transition from youth to adult in just a few short years.

How to Avoid Poverty

on August 30, 2016. According to Galveston, only about 8% of the families that followed these rules fell into poverty, while 80% who did not follow these guidelines did fall into poverty.

Graduate from high school (at least).
Get a job right away (you can get a better job later).
Do not have a baby until after being married.
Marry wisely.
Stay out of trouble.

Education

Education is important. How much education a person needs depends on what type of work a teenager is inspired to do for life. A good education does not guarantee a good income, but it does improve your chances substantially. It is good to learn the skills that you need for your vocation. It may not be necessarily wise to invest a significant amount of money chasing a dream job if the reality is that the dream job will never pay well.

A teenager should begin seeking God about the direction their

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life should take while still young. Be encouraged to talk much to your parents, to your elders, to others that you respect about education and work possibilities.

And remember, when you are young, you have the luxury of being able to change your mind midstream. I know of a very honorable young man in the church that started off as a helicopter pilot in the military. He later became a police officer, and then later again became a doctor! Now that is one amazing young man!

You may stumble a few times getting started, but don't give up. Even when we stumble God is there to help us pick ourselves up and move forward.

The steps of a good man are ordered by the Lord, And He delights in his way.

Employment

A teenager, or young person should find a way to enter the workforce as soon as possible. Your first job will most likely be low paying, but it will build good working habits and discipline that will help you for the second job. First job opens the door for the second job. There is nothing wrong with humbly accepting a low paying job to begin with.

When you do work, put your whole heart into whatever you do. Work as unto the Lord, and the Lord will honor you.

Colossians 3:22-24 (NKJV)

Bondservants, obey in all things your masters according to the flesh, not with eyeservice, as men-pleasers, but in sincerity of heart, fearing God. And whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord and not to men, 24 knowing that from the Lord you will receive the reward of the inheritance; for you serve the Lord Christ.

Colossians 3:17 (NKJV)

And whatever you do in word or deed, do all in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him.

Don't have a baby until you are married.

In the hour we live in, men and women have adopted the morals of mice. Being a single parent, having a child outside of marriage is the single biggest ticket to poverty there is. Unfortunately, when children are born outside of marriage, it is usually the young woman that pays the highest price.

Let's be blunt and clear. Babies come from having sex. If a young man pressures his girlfriend to have sex, he is essentially saying "lets take a risk that you (the girl) will live in poverty for many years to come, for a few moments of temporary pleasure that we will experience, while I (the boy) have no obligations to you".

If a boy says to his girlfriend "If you love me, you will sleep with me," she should reply to him "If you loved me, you would not ask!"

1 Corinthians 6:18 (NKJV)

Flee sexual immorality. Every sin that a man does is outside the body, but he who commits sexual immorality sins against his own body.

Hebrews 13:4 (NKJV)

Marriage is honorable among all, and the bed undefiled; but fornicators and adulterers God will judge.

Marry wisely.

Getting married to the right person is crucial. One should have the attitude that marriage is for life. Marriage is not something that you "try out" by living together. It is a lifelong commitment "until death due you part." You should "date" those who would make a good "mate."

There are many books available for pre-marriage counseling. However, I often find that it is good to thoughtfully consider the marriage vows that are repeated at the wedding. If you find a person that you feel confident in making these promises to, you do well.

Most vows go something like this: I vow to love and to hold (you) in sickness and in health, for richer or for poorer, for better or for worse, until death do us part. Then, spend the rest of your life keeping that promise.

God is interested in your future mate. Lean on the Lord, and keep your eyes open for that right one. Be both patient and persistent. Look for a godly partner that shares your faith and values. Don't compromise.

2 Corinthians 6:14 (NKJV)

Do not be unequally yoked together with unbelievers. For what fellowship has righteousness with lawlessness? And what communion has light with darkness?

Stay out of trouble.

The best way to stay out of trouble is to stay away from the wrong people. It is better to have no friends than it is to have the wrong friends. Pick your friends carefully. Don't be afraid to advertise your Christian values.

Proverbs 12:26 (NKJV)


The righteous should choose his friends carefully, For the way of the wicked leads them astray.

1. Stop and think before you drink. (don't drink!)

2. Don't let your parents down; they brought you up.

3. Be humble enough to obey. You'll be giving orders someday. Respect authority.

4. At the first moment, turn away from unclean thoughts - at the first moment.

5. Don't show off driving. If you want to race, go to a race track

6. Choose a date who would make a good mate.

7. Go to church faithfully. The Creator gives you the week. Give Him an hour.

8. Choose your companions carefully. You are what they are.

9. Avoid following the crowd. Be an engine, not a caboose.

10. Be master of your habits or they will master you. (good habits, getting up early, working hard and diligently, studying well, reading the Bible daily)

11. Treasure your time; don't spend it; invest it.

12. Stand for something or you will fall for anything.

13. See what you can do for others; not what they can do for you.
